Samuel Scrogin (D5) was a son of Joseph Scrogin (C1) and Sarah Ann Caldwell of Somerset County, Maryland.<sup>1</sup> Elizabeth "Betty" Collins was a daughter of Joseph Collins and Sarah Boyce of Worcester County, Maryland.<sup>2</sup>

The birth and death dates of Samuel Scrogin (D5) were entered in his family register and that of his father Joseph Scrogin (C1), which were copied in 1892 from the papers of Thomas Davis Scrogin (F44), son of George Scrogin (E11) and grandson of Samuel Scrogin (D5), possessed then by a descendant in Farber, Missouri:<sup>3</sup>

Samuel Scrogin (D5) must have been born in Somerset County, Maryland, where his parents were known to reside at the time.

Betty Collins Scrogin probably was born about 1748, since she was old enough in 1766 to be named as an executrix of her father's will.<sup>4</sup> Her birthplace undoubtedly was Worcester County, Maryland, the known residence of her parents.

Samuel Scrogin (D5) and Betty Collins probably were married about 1773, since their first child was born on 04 August 1774. In a Bourbon County, Kentucky, deposition,<sup>5</sup> Samuel testified that he first met one of his wife's relatives in 1773, which supports the probability that they were married that year.

Samuel also testified that he and his wife Betty lived at Laurel, Delaware. Laurel was once known as Broad Creek Bridge and was in the part of Somerset County, Maryland, that was realigned into Sussex County, Delaware. Betty Collins Scrogin inherited 400 acres of a tract called Collins Industry, near Broad Creek Bridge, from her father in 1767.<sup>6</sup>

Broad Creek in Sussex County, Delaware, is a tributary of the Nanticoke River in the area that was considered part of Stepney Parish, Worcester County, Maryland, in 1770, before the boundary between Maryland and Delaware was clearly defined:<sup>7</sup>

The third Chapel of Ease in Stepney Parish was the chapel erected near the head of Broad Creek (a tributary of Nanticoke River), the building of which took place during the years 1770 and 1772, and which stands at the present time (1934) under the name of 'Old Christ Church,' about one and a half miles east of the town of Laurel, in Sussex County, Delaware, at Chipman's Mill Pond. In 1770, when the erection of this chapel was petitioned for, the lands in that area were counted as being in that part of Stepney Parish that lay in Worcester County, Maryland. The determination of the Maryland-Delaware boundary line had not been wholly accepted. Stepney Parish was at that time partly in Somerset County (Wicomico County not being created until 1867) and partly in Worcester County.

The inhabitants of Stepney Parish residing at, or near, the head of Broad Creek, being very remote from any place of public worship (i.e. any church, or chapel, of the Church of England), petitioned the General Assembly of Maryland in 1770 that an Act might be passed levying 80,000 pounds of tobacco on the inhabitants of Stepney Parish for the purpose of enabling the vestry to purchase land on the north side of Broad Creek, at or near Broad Creek Bridge [this bridge crossed Broad Creek at the site of the present Laurel, Delaware], and to erect thereon a Chapel of Ease. In accordance with this petition the Maryland Assembly passed the Act in 1770, and in accordance therewith two acres of land were purchased on the north side of Broad Creek (some little distance above the bridge) and the chapel erected thereon. This building, of frame construction, has remarkable wainscoting, gallery, high pulpit on the north wall (with reading desk below); Holy Table with enclosing rails in the east end, and high-backed, boxed, double pews - the natural heart-pine wood left unpainted. Today the severely plain, barn-like exterior encloses an original pure, natural interior of charm and beauty. Fragments of an old account book of Stepney Parish, prove that Robert Holston was the contractor for the building of this chapel at the sum of L510 currency, the first payment made January 25, 1771, the second payment in 1772, and on September 25, 1772, the item appears: 'Mr. Robert Houstin (the name of the contractor in this single instance 'Robert Houstin.' In every other instance (many times) the name is distinctly and unmistakably 'Holston.') in account with the Vestry of Stepney Parish, Dr. £150:0:0. 1772, Sepr. 25 pr Contra By Building a Chappell at Broad Creek, Cr. £510:0:0.

The 'Broad Creek Chapel,' erected 1770-1772, now called 'Old Christ Church,' is in Sussex County, Delaware, Diocese of Delaware.

The fragmentary old account book of Stepney Parish - loose pages, and many leaves missing - carried entries from 1769-1805. On some leaves appear vestry records from 1803 on, and Confirmations, 1803 and 1807, and names of many parties, both white and colored, who subscribed obedience to the canon law of the Church. Evidently the old book, begun as an account book, was later used for vestry records and as a parish register. This old manuscript is now (1934) in possession of Cassius M. Dashiell, of Princess Anne, registrar of the Diocese of Easton.

Reputedly, the six sons of Joseph Scrogin (C1) all served in the Revolutionary War.<sup>8</sup> Samuel Scrogin (D5) supposedly was a lieutenant, but a record of his service has not been found. Perhaps he saw duty in the militia. Service files for his brothers John (D2), Robert (D7), Philip (D10) and Thomas (D12) are among the Revolutionary War records in the National Archives. A record of service by Joseph, Jr. (D4) has not been located.

Upon the death of Joseph Scrogin (C1) in 1773, Samuel Scrogin (D5) inherited his father's blue broadcloth coat, his velvet vest and a tract of 100 acres of land called Anything from his extensive land holdings in Somerset County.<sup>9</sup>

Joseph Scrogin (E9) probably died before 26 March 1785, when Joseph Collins Scrogin (E13) was born, considering the reuse of the name Joseph. Joseph Collins Scrogin (E13) and Samuel Scrogin, Jr. (E15) also probably died young. None of these sons are mentioned in the records of Bourbon County, Kentucky, and they were not residing with their parents when the 1810 census was enumerated there.

When Samuel sold the tract named Anything to his brother, John Scrogin (D2), on 16 May 1785 for 50 pounds, he was described as a resident of Somerset County:<sup>10</sup>

This Indenture made this sixteenth day of May Anno Dom. seventeen hundred and eighty five between Samuel Scroggin of Somerset County in the province of Maryland of the one part and John Scrogin of the same place of the other part Witnesseth that the said Samuel Scroggin for and in consideration of the sum of fifty pounds to him paid before the sealing and delivery of these presents the receipt whereof the said Samuel Scroggin doth hereby acknowledge and himself fully satisfied and contented hath granted bargained and sold aliened confessed released conveyed and confirmed and by these presents doth grant bargain sell alien confess release convey and confirm unto the said John Scrogin his heirs and assigns forever all that tract or parcel of land lying and being in Somerset County called and known by the name of Anything which is bounded limited and described as in and by the original grant thereof (reference?) being thereunto had will appear containing one hundred acres more or less ...  
In testimony Whereof the party aforesaid hath to these presents his hand set and seal affixed.

The witnesses were Justices of the Peace for Somerset County before whom Samuel legally acknowledged the deed on the same day.

Samuel and Betty Collins Scrogin apparently moved to Sussex County, Delaware, after selling Anything, perhaps to reside on the land that she inherited from her father, because they were residents of Delaware in 1787 when their son John was born (Federal Census, National Archives Record Group No. 29, 1850, Iowa, Clayton County, page 177). Samuel Scrogin (D5), Philip Scrogin (D10) and Thomas Scrogin (D12) appear on the 1790 census for Broad Creek Hundred in Delaware with their names misspelled as “Serogen” and “Sarogen.”<sup>11</sup>

According to family tradition, after selling Anything to his brother, Samuel Scrogin (D5) journeyed to Kentucky with Ephraim Polk III and others from Sussex County in 1786, to evaluate the land for family settlement. They apparently found the beautiful rolling land of the Bluegrass region of central Kentucky to their liking.<sup>12</sup> Elizabeth Scrogin (E1), daughter of John (D2) and Eunice Polk Scrogin, was in Woodford County, Kentucky, by 04 December 1792 when she married Jesse Brown, son of George Brown. Samuel Scrogin who was in Bartlett’s Company of Mounted Cavalry in Hall’s Regiment of Kentucky Volunteers in 1793 probably was Samuel (E3), son of John (D2). Samuel Scrogin (D5) testified that he came to Kentucky from Delaware in 1794.<sup>13</sup>

Traditionally it has been said that the Polks and Scrogins traveled from Delaware to Kentucky by way of Fort Redstone (now Brownsville), Pennsylvania, on the Monongahela River, thence by flatboat down the Monongahela to the Ohio River at Pittsburgh, on downstream to the Kentucky River and up the Kentucky to the central part of the state. Instead of boating up the Kentucky River, it is more likely that the Scrogins left the Ohio River at Limestone Creek, where the town of Maysville is located now, and continued to central Kentucky overland, which was the popular route at that time. In 1784 Simon Kenton, with Edward and John Waller, built a blockhouse at Limestone. That same year Kenton improved his settlement near the head of Lawrence’s Creek in (now) Mason County, which he established in 1775 but had been forced to abandon for nine years. He erected a new blockhouse and some cabins. A year earlier the Tanner family built a station at Blue Licks and the route between these stations became “a favorite avenue for immigrants” into Kentucky.<sup>14</sup> From Delaware, the travelers probably crossed Maryland to Cumberland in the western part of the state and used the Cumberland Trail from there to Redstone, Pennsylvania. US40 now follows the Cumberland Trail, which was opened by Christopher Gist in 1752 when, with the aid of Nemocolin, the Delaware Indian Chief, he blazed a horse trail from Cumberland west into the wilderness of the Allegheny Mountains for use by the traders of the Ohio Company. Two years later, when the French were threatening to take over the Ohio Territory, the trail was widened into a road for wagon travel and extended to a point near Uniontown, Pennsylvania, by an expedition of 150 volunteers led by 22-year-old Major George Washington of the Virginia militia. At this time the Virginians engaged a French force, defeated them and built Fort Necessity. Six weeks later the French attacked Washington’s troops, defeated the Virginians and allowed them to march back to Virginia “with honor.” The next year

English General Edward Braddock led a force of from 1500 to 2000 men along the trail to attack Fort Duquesne (Pittsburgh). Ambushed by the French and Indians near Fort Necessity, Braddock and about half of his men were killed. Washington led the survivors into a safe retreat. Braddock was buried under part of the trail that became the main artery for troopers, traders and settlers headed west during the next 75 years. It was called National Road after 1806.

When the white explorers first came to Kentucky, they found few Indians living there, despite the abundance of game and natural resources in the region. Instead the fabled “dark and bloody ground” or “great meadow” was visited and fought over by tribes that resided north of the Ohio and south of the Cumberland rivers. The Indian tribes found in Kentucky, prior to the coming of the pioneers, were Shawnee, Cherokee and Chickasaw. These people were descendants of the prehistoric Paleo-Indians that archaeologists identify as the earliest culture in Kentucky, existing there from 13,000 to 6,000 B.C. The Cherokee and Chickasaw lived south of Kentucky; the Cherokee on the upper Tennessee River, in the highlands of the Carolinas, Georgia and Alabama, and the Chickasaw, who were generally friendly, on the lower Tennessee and Mississippi rivers. North of the Ohio River were the Delaware, known as Loup to the French and Lenni Lenape, which means “Original Men,” to themselves. Parents of the Algonquin race of Indians, the Lenni Lenape lived around Delaware Bay when William Penn arrived and were gradually pushed westward during colonial times to the land immediately west of the Allegheny Mountains. Next to the Lenni Lenape were the war-like Shawnee, the most ferocious and daring of the tribes. Called “Shawanoë” by the French, the Shawnee fled to the Carolinas and Florida, after their defeat by the Five Nations in 1672, and later returned north, where they joined the Miami Confederacy. The Miami tribe lived in Ohio on the Scioto River. Sometimes called “Twightwees,” the Miami pronounced their name Mi-a-mi-ah. The Wyandot and Huron were the easternmost tribes of the Miami Confederacy and adjoined the Seneca, the most western of the tribes of the Five Nations that became known as the Six Nations or Iroquois. The Six Nations lived around lakes Erie, Ontario and Huron. In Illinois, the Indian tribes were the Kaskaskia and the Peoria. At the time of the entry of the white men into Kentucky, the Indians living around the Ohio Valley numbered about 25,000 to 30,000, of which about one-fifth were warriors.

When Samuel Scrogin (D5) first visited Kentucky in 1786, he had been preceded as early as 1669 when LaSalle navigated the Ohio River, which the French called “La Belle Riviere.” In that same year some Spaniards explored the Ohio, up as far as where Pittsburgh is now located. Six explorers who visited Kentucky have been credited largely for the white settlement of the area: Dr. Thomas Walker in 1750, Christopher Gist in 1751, James McBride in 1754, John Finley in 1767, Daniel Boone in 1769, Simon Kenton in 1771 and Captain Thomas Bullitt who explored the area that is now Jefferson County in 1773. George Washington drove one of the first claim stakes on the Big Sandy River in 1770. James Harrod established the first white settlement in Kentucky in 1774 at Harrodsburg. A year earlier Daniel Boone tried to bring his family and others into Kentucky to live, but Indians turned them back. In 1775, despite several Indian attacks, Boone was successful in founding Boonesborough on the Kentucky River. His 16-year-old nephew Daniel Wilcoxson joined Boone at Boonesborough in 1776. Later he married Sally Faulconer and had Jane Wilcoxson who married William Bohannon. They were the

parents of Pamela Bohannon who married Benjamin Scrogin (F45), grandson of Samuel Scrogin (D5). Louisville was settled under the leadership of George Rogers Clark in 1778.

The birth date of Samuel Scrogin (D5), and the fact that his father Joseph Scrogin maintained a family record, is verified in a deposition that Samuel made in 1819. The date of the migration of Samuel Scrogin (D5) from Delaware to Kentucky was also stated in the deposition, which he made in connection with a lawsuit brought by his son Robert Scrogin (E10) and Oakley Wright against John Allen, the second husband of Betsy Cope Edgar Allen, a cousin of Betty Collins Scrogin. Robert Scrogin (E10) was involved in the administration of the estate of Betsy Cope's first husband Henry Edgar and a dispute arose over Robert's action in purchasing the estate rights of Henry Edgar's half-brothers and half-sisters, some of whom resided in Ohio and others in Sussex County, Delaware. Robert sued Betsy and her second husband John Allen for the portion of the estate that he considered due to the half-brothers and half-sisters. The suit was filed in Harrison County, Kentucky, but Robert secured a change of venue to Bourbon County. The Allens won the case and the Appellate Court upheld the decision. Depositions pertaining largely to the identity of Betsy Cope (Copes) and the parentage and family of Henry Edgar (Edger) were taken in Ohio and Delaware:<sup>15</sup>

In conformity to Notice to take Depositions (at the House of Major Wm. Griffith on this day being the first Monday and Seventh day of June 1819) to be read as evidence in a suit depending and Undetermined in the Harrison Circuit Court wherein Robert Scrogin and Oakly Wright are Complainants and John Allen and Others are Defendants. The following dispossitions were taken to wit.

The deposition of Samuel Scrogin of lawful age who being first duly sworn saith.

Quest. by Pltffs How long have you been acquainted with Henry Edger (Blacksmith) who Married Betsy Copes the Present wife of John Allen? Ansr. from the year 1773 he was then to appearance about 5 or 6 years old. by same Relate what you know or have heard respecting his Parentage. Ansr. I was informed by the family who from Marriage connection I was intimate with that he was the Bastard Son of Issabella Henry and charged by her to be the son of Henry Edger who was Married Comfort Boyce an own aunt to my wife It was in her family after She became the wife of Wm. Hobbs that I first became acquainted with the said Henry Edger, B.S. as above stated and she kept the child Henry Edger from the time I first became acquainted with him untill he was bound Josua Hall to learn the trade of Blacksmith sd. Hall was also cousin to my wife & after said Edger was free he set up shop in my neighborhood & did my work for several years he then married Betsy Copes a Cousin of my wife the present Mrs. Allen & in the year 1794 I removed from the State of Delaware to Kentucky & Henry Edger removed in the year 1795 & about the year 1797 purchased Land on Mill Creek in Harrison County & settled there & sometime past departed this life

Quest. Who did Isabella Henry marry after the birth of Henry Edger - Ansr. She married a certain Jessee Wright I was acquainted with her before her marriage &

 Quest. had she children by Wright - Ansr. yes Quest by same - have you not

The signature, "X" mark and notation "his mark" are in a different handwriting from the deposition itself. The signature, mark and notation appear to be by the same hand, suggesting that Samuel signed the deposition and also marked it.

In a deposition taken at another time and place, Charles E. Mills testified that in late June or early July of 1818 he took a letter from the post office in Paris, Kentucky, directed to Mrs. Narcissa Scrogin, wife of Robert Scrogin of Bourbon County, and delivered it to her as directed. He declared that Narcissa Scrogin showed him the letter at that time and that it was from Betsy Allen who requested that Narcissa write to her husband, who was then in Delaware, and instruct him to not make certain purchases on her behalf. Mills further attested that, accordingly, Narcissa got her husband's brother, George Scrogin, to write to Robert in Delaware and that George and Narcissa forwarded the original letter, signed by Betsy Allen, to Robert as an enclosure with their letter.

Henry Edger, father by Isabella Henry of the bastard blacksmith Henry Edger, deceased first husband of Betsy Cope Allen, also had a legitimate son by Comfort Boyce who was known as Henry Edger, Jr. Henry Edger, Jr. described the dispute between Robert Scrogin (E10) and Betsy Cope Allen in his deposition pertaining to the lawsuit:<sup>16</sup>

The deposition of Henry Edger taken at the tavern house of William Samuel in Cynthiana agreeable to notice to be read as evidence in a suit in chancery [illegible] in the Bourbon Circuit Court wherein Robert Scrogin & al are complainants and John Allen & Wife & others are Defts. This deponent being of lawfull age first duly sworn deposeth & saith upon being interrogated in addition to the testimony heretofore given by him -



Questn. by Defts. Will you state the connexion and kindred existing between the Compl. Scroggin and Saml. Scroggin, Sr. also of Mrs. Comfort Hobbs & Mr. Asher Boyce the persons who have deposed in this cause? - Ansr. Mr. Saml Scroggin is the Complts. Father - Mrs. Comfort Hobbs is an Aunt of the Complts. Mother - Mr. Asher Boyce is a Cousin to his Mother - myself and my wife stand in the same connexion - What is the connexion of James Moore & the Complt.? Ansr. he is a distant connexion of the Complt. - By same Do you not believe that James Moore's memory is very much impaired by his excessive dissipation? Ansr. I think his memory is better than I should expect - By same - Is he a man who strictly adheres to the truth at all times? Ansr. I think he is a man who would depose to the truth as well as any person when sober - When his deposition was taken I think he was more composed than usual - Question of Complainant Scroggin. Will you Please to relate as far as your Memory Serves you the whole Conversation that has passed between you and myself respecting the matter in Controversy between myself & Mrs. Allen? This deponent States that having heard from report in his Neighbourhood that the Complainant Robert Scroggin had purchased the Interest of the reputed Half Brothers & sisters of Henry Edger Decd. to his Edgers Estate and that there was a gross disagreement between his Scroggin's Statements and Mrs. Allens the former wife of said Edger Decd. respecting the circumstances of the said purchase and Respecting Mrs. Allens makeing application to said Scroggin to Purchase for her Benefit and haveing met with Scroggin (for the first time) after he made said purchases at the Circuit Court in Cynthiana in March 1819 he this deponent asked Scroggin to give him a History of the whole matter which Scroggin Complied with and as near as this deponent can Recollect in the following manner. Scroggin stated to this deponent that after the death of Mrs. Allen's son James T. Edger she Mrs. Allen & her Husband John Allen spent an Evening at the said Scrogins own house on their Return to Woodford after having buried her son at her former residence in Harrison County that in the morning Mrs. Allen asked him Scrogins (between themselves) what was his opinion as to the course of the Estate of her former husband Descending to her or to his Edgar's Half Brothers & Sisters, that he said Scroggin did take the act of Assembly directing the course of decents and gave it to her to read and that they both agreed in Opinion that the Half brothers and Sisters would Inherit two thirds of said Edgers Estate until the death of Mrs. Allen and that then they would be intitled to the whole Estate (Slaves and Land). upon this said Scroggin stated that he advised Mrs. Allen if she wished to retain the Property to purchase from the Half brothers & Sisters. that they were nonresidents. that they would sell cheap. but Mrs. Allen observed that if she could hold her thirds in the Estate of her former Husband it was as much as she had any use for and that she never would let the subject disturb her peace again. said Scroggin then advised her to administer on the Estate of her Son and settle up her accounts as Guardian, and if ever the Wrights came to claim the property let there be no Complaint and so the conversation ended for this time. that he Scroggin saw no more of Mrs. Allen until April 1818 when herself and husband spent another Evening at his house. before Mrs. Allen started home she asked Scroggin to take a walk with her in the Garden which he did that as soon as they entered the walk of the Garden Mrs. Allen Burst into tears and they walked the whole length of the Garden before she Mrs. Allen

became so much Relieved by her tears as to speak. said Scrogin stated that he felt unaccountably moved by her distress (apprehending some disagreeable occurrence in her family) and at Length asked her what was the matter after sobbing for some time she exclaimed what should she do about this property Scrogin asked her what property. why said she Coventon Coleman and Wm. Safford have threatened to go and buy the Interest of the Wrights to Mr. Edger's Estate and dispossess me. Scrogin then observed to Mrs. Allen that if they did they could never dispossess her of her thirds and that was enough for her (referring to their former Conversation on the Subject) that Mrs. Allen Exclaimed that she could not think of parting with the Negroes that he Scrogin then Renewed his proposal to her to purchase herself. she stated that she had no person to do it for her that her husband Mr. Allen and herself had agreed before their Marriage for each to manage their own property and enjoy it and that he would do nothing on it. Scrogin then mentioned her nephew & Robt. Wingate who were men of Business stated that it would take them but a few days to go to the state of Ohio (where Scrogin had been Informed the Wrights Lived) that Mrs. Allen Informed him that four of Mr. Edger's half Brothers and sisters still lived in the State of Delaware. and then urged Scrogin to undertake the business for her (she having understood that he Scrogin was going to the State of Delaware a short time with a drove of horses) that he Scrogin then Replied to Mrs. Allen that his wife was in a weak state of health and that he could not agree to be detained long from home Mrs. Allen then renewed her request with the utmost eloquence proposing to give his own charge and observing that it would not detain him many days longer from home. and upon this Scrogin agreed to do what he could for her if she would furnish him with the money. she then said she had not the money by her and that she did not know what to do, and then asked him Scrogin if he could not lend her the money and she would repay him with Interest on his return. that he Scrogin told Mrs. Allen that he could not tell, but it was probable that he could if he sold his horses for cash. Otherwise he could not. but that if he could spare the money and the Wrights were willing to sell their interest in their Half brothers Estate that he Scrogin would purchase for Mrs. Allens Benefit. at as cheap a rate as he could. and Mrs. Allen was to repay him his money and Expenses and Trouble as soon as he returned. upon this arraignment being settled, Scrogin stated that he proposed to her to call Mr. Allen her husband who was in the house 4 or 5 rods from them and make him acquainted with the arraignment. But Mrs. Allen Exclaimed Oh! no it is not Necessary for it will only make him uneasy for he does not know anything of Colemans and Saffords threats. and I cannot bear for him to be uneasy on my Account. that upon this Scrogin requested Mrs. Allen to consult some attorney as to the supposed Heirs claim and not to purchase unless he advised it. Mrs. Allen then referred him Scrogin to B. -. Mills Esqr. and requested him to consult Mr. Mills for her that she was desirous to get home. and that it was agreed between them that if Mr. Mills advised the purchase and it could be made Scrogin was to make it. but if Mr. Mills did not advise the purchase it was not to be made and as soon as Mr. Mills was Consulted Scrogin was to write to Mrs. Allen and let her know what his advice was. that if the purchase was advised by Mr. Mills that she might make arrangements to pay Scrogin upon his return. he Scrogin then requested Mrs. Allen to tell him how much to give for the property provided he

could spare the money & Mills should advise the purchase and the Heirs were willing to sell. that Mrs. Allen told him that he might go as high as \$1,000 provided he could purchase from all the Heirs. but not one cent higher and in that proportion if he only purchased from a part of them. Mrs. Allen then in the most pathetic manner requested him (Scrogin) to keep the matter of their arraignment a profound secret from every person Living (but Mr. Mills) for that if Coleman & Safford found out that he was going to purchase that they would go on and be before him in the purchase. for he Scrogin had told Mrs. Allen that he expected to be detained some time in the State of Virginia on his road to Delaware. and no more passed between them at that time. Scrogin stated he consulted Mr. Mills as Mrs. Allen had requested that Mr. Mills advised him to purchase and that he Scrogin wrote to Mrs. Allen (by Mail) to that effect. and that shortly after started on his journey to the Eastward without seeing or hearing from Mrs. Allen anymore. that he was detained on the road much longer than he Expected and when he arrived in Delaware, and before he made any purchase of the Wrights (not having sold his horses) and had not the money to give. he received a Letter at the post office in Laurel Town Delaware, wrote by his brother (at the request of his Scrogin's wife) directed to him containing a letter inclosed in it from Mrs. Allen to said Scrogins wife in Kentucky dated 16th June 1818 requesting said Scrogin's wife to write to him (if he had gone to Delaware) and let him Know that she (Mrs. Allen) "did not wish him (Scrogin) to make any purchase of the Wrights in her favour" &c. which Letter said Scrogin took from his pocket book and showed this deponant which (said Letter) was in the handwriting of Mrs. Allen this deponant sometime after this Conversation with Scrogin while acting as a Magistrate in takeing the dispossession Charles E. Mills in this suit, heard Mrs. Allen acknowledge that she wrote the said Letter referring to the same letter that Scrogin had showed this deponant in march before which Letter was produced and referred to by said Chas. E. Mills in his dispossession. Scrogin further stated to this deponant that when he received this Letter from (Mrs. Allen to his wife) that he was much Astonished at the Contents of the Letter it being so different from her last conversation with him on the subject referred to. and as said Letter contained a possitive Statement that She (Mrs. Allen) would write immediately to her brother who resided in Delaware "to try if Possible to prevent his (Scrogins) undertaking so Hazzardous an Enterprize" that he then quit his other business and went 25 or 30 Miles to her brothers (Joseph Cope's) to See if she had wrote to him as she had promised to do in her Letter to his Scrogins wife. but Mr. Copes had received no Letter from Mrs. Allen on the Subject Scrogin then stated that he then informed Mr. Copes of the whole arraignment between himself and Mrs. Allen before he Left Kentucky and Showed him her Letter and asked his Advice, that Mr. Copes gave it as his Opinion that as Mr. Scrogin had only had a private Conversation with Mrs. Allen on the Subject of the purchase 2 or 3 months before her Letter was wrote and as the letter was Expressive of her later wish that he (Scrogin) ought to be Governed by it and that if he did purchase with the letter in his possession that his sister (Mrs. Allen) would not Remunerate him his money Interest &c. and as this was his Scrogins own private opinion, he determined to have nothing to do with the purchase. that some time after this he met with one of the Legatees (Will. Eskridge) at a Public meeting and Eskridge told him Scrogin

that as he had declined to purchase for Mrs. Allen after having got her Letter that the Legatees wished to sell their Interest and that they would sell to him (Scrogin) cheaper than they would to any other person and that if he did not buy for his own benefit they would sell to others who were bidding for the property. they (the Legatees) being fully satisfied that Scrogin was excusable from Compleating their contract after that he had received from Mrs. Allens Letter directing him not to purchase for her benefit Scrogin [illegible] that Eskridges statement "that others were bidding for the property and that the Heirs were determined to sell" brought him Scrogin to a pause. he reflected on his own Situation he was joint Administrator with Mrs. Allen on her former husbands Estate and also her Security as Guardian to her Son, and she had all the property in her hands, and from her statement that she and Mr. Allen did business seperately, and he could not tell what she meant by the "train she had the business in" mentioned in her Letter to his wife, which he had received. that he Scrogin at Length Concluded to purchase in his own name and for his own Benefit. and did so from three of the Heirs living in Delaware and from three living in the State of Ohio Oakly Wright having gone to the City of Washington in the Interim between his (Scrogins) declining to purchase for Mrs. Allens Benefit and comeing to the conclution to purchase in his own name, and did not return before he Scrogin left the Country, (i.e. that is Delaware) that upon his return to Kentucky he went to see Mrs. Allen at her own residence in Woodford but as a number of Circumstances had impressed his mind of a Deep laid Plot to take him in for the purchase of said Estate by Mrs. Allen, such as Her takeing him out between themselves her Excessive Grief and flow of Tears (which was rather uncommon for her to indulge in) her Refuseing to let her husband Know any thing about the Business and her Intire change of mind expressed in her letter to his wife which Letter he (Scrogin) concluded was never intended by Mrs. Allen to go to Delaware but to remain at home with his wife until his return. When Mrs. Allen Naturally concluded the Purchase would be made. and as he had no proof of their agreement Mrs. Allen would do Just as she Pleased this conviction Scrogin said he gathered from Mrs. Allens writing to his wife in Kentucky instead of himself in Delaware for Mrs. Allen knew much better where his business lay in Delaware (she havine been raised there) than his wife did who was raised in Virginia. also her Promiseing to write to her Brother in Delaware and not doing it. this sentence he inferred was intended to prevent his wife writing to him or sending on Mrs. Allens letter as she Mrs Allen knew that his wife was weakly and that by the mail delays were common. But that being determined to see whether his suspicions were correct or not he went to see her himself. that between themselves in going to her Nephews (Secretary Ball's) within a small Distance from her own residence with only her little stepdaughter (a child) in Company. that he Scrogin told Mrs. Allen that he had purchased from six of the Half brothers & sisters of her former husband out of seven, without stating in whose name the deeds were drawn, that She laughing said she was sorry for it. yet appeared extremely delighted by the playful smile upon her countenance, and observed that he Scrogin must have money plenty to go and buy the Interest of the Wrights to her Property. that he then asked her Mrs. Allen if she was going to serve him in this manner? She made answer, that if he (Scrogin) was such a fool as to give away his money to the

Wrights for their claim to her property he might get it the best way he could for that she Mrs. Allen would Never give him one Cent. and then in the most taunting manner asked him if he had not seen a letter from her to his wife since his return. he (Scrogin) answered that he was much astonished to see that Letter without telling where he had seen it first. that Mrs. Allen then observed that she had intirely changed her mind since she had seen him last and that her letter to his wife Contained her views and determination and that he (Scrogin) need never say another word to her upon the subject. but to get his money the best way he could for that she never would give him one cent. Scrogin then stated that he was now fully Convinced that his suspicions were well founded but yet unwilling to Expose Mrs. Allen who was his own Relation. he told her that he had got her letter in Delaware before he made the purchase and that he discovered that she had changed her mind and that instead of taking Title in her name he had taken the Deeds in his name and paid his own money. She then changed her countenance to agree with her words and abused him very much after her storm abated he told her to pay him up his money according to their first agreement and let him transfer to her and not Expose themselves to the disgrace of a Lawsuit that She Mrs. Allen apeared astonished at his offer and after some time asked him in a friendly tone what the purchase would Cost. that he Scrogin told her that he had purchased from Six out of seven of the Heirs and that he had left the money with a friend to buy for him Oakly Wrights Interest who was the Seventh Legatee but did not know what he might charge but that \$600. would cover the whole Purchase. after a pause of some time Mrs. Allen burst forth into a violent torrent of abuse for some Minutes that he Scrogin then urged her to make him whole and Prevent a Lawsuit for that he could not afford to loose his money and if she did not pay him he must resort to the Laws, that the more he urged her to compromise the more she appeared averse to it, and as they ceased to converse Mrs. Allen threatened to run the negroes out of the State. that this Conversation between Scrogin & Mrs. Allen took place in the last of October or first of November 1818 that he Scrogin endeavoured to effect a compromise afterwards through Joseph Ward, Esqr. Mrs. Allen's agent in Harrison but could not effect it. then made another Effort with her husband but failed also. and at the March term 1819 brought Suit for the property. this deponant has repeatedly since heard Scrogin make most the foregoing statements to others in his presents and they always were to the same Effect. this deponant also states that he has when acting as a Magistrate in takeing Depositions in this Suit frequently heard Mrs. Betsy Allen state that she never did authorise the said Scrogin to make any purchase for her or in her favour from the Wrights neither between themselves nor in any other manner and that She never changed a word with Scrogin on the Subject in her life. this deponant also states that he has been Intimately acquainted with the parties and that to his certain Knowledge When ever Mrs. Edger before her Intermarriage with Mr. Allen both while she was the wife of Henry Edger and during her Widowhood was greatly attached to said Scrogin (as well as her husband Henry Edger Decd) and that when any matter of importance was to be transacted that Scrogin was always or Generally called on as a particular friend and until the present Difference as far as this deponant knows or believes their friendship was uninterrupted. Quest. by Defts. Was the above conversation between the Compl.

No, we have had several conversations on the subject at different times - the principal part was at our first interview - By same - Be so kind as to distinguish the subject matter of the Different conversations held betwixt yourself & the Compl. Upon his arrival in Kentucky in 1794, Samuel Scrogin (D5) apparently made an informal purchase agreement for 200 acres on Townsend Creek in Bourbon County. The deed of conveyance to him from George and Elizabeth Smith was not accomplished until 16 August 1796<sup>17</sup> but Samuel was taxed for the land from 1795 through 1803:<sup>18</sup>

The poll tax for 1 white male over 16 and under 21 in 1795 probably covered Robert Scrogin (E10), who was 18, but did not reflect the fact that George Scrogin (E11) became 16 the day before the tax was assessed. This assessment supports the assumption that Joseph Scrogin (E9) died young. The poll tax for two white males 16-21 in 1797 would account for both Robert and George. The 1800 assessment reflects the sale by Samuel and Betty Scrogin of half of their land to son Robert on 01 August 1798.<sup>19</sup> This may have been motivated by the fact that Robert had married Narcissa Mills sometime previously and was expecting his first child at any time. Daughter Louise was born on 22 August 1798.<sup>20</sup> The 1800 poll tax for 2 white males over 16 and under 21 could cover son George who became 21 that year and perhaps Joseph Collins Scrogin (E13) who would have been 15 in 1800. If the second person was Joseph Collins Scrogin (E13), then he apparently died before the 1801 assessment when the second male over 21 would have

to be George Scrogin (E11). The second white male over 21 in 1802 and 1803 also would cover George who did not get married until 1809.

If the 1797 assessment was correct in stating that Samuel had possessed the land since 1792, then he must have arranged the acquisition before moving to Kentucky in 1794.

Bourbon County, which was formed in 1786 from part of Fayette County, was one of the ten counties in Virginia that comprised Kentucky when it was admitted to statehood on 01 June 1792. Fayette, Lincoln and Jefferson counties originated in 1780 when Kentucky County, Virginia, was subdivided. Kentucky County was erected from Fincastle County, Virginia, in 1776, with the county seat at Harrodsburg.

Samuel Scrogin (D5) paid L160 to George Smith and his wife Elizabeth of Fayette County, Kentucky, for the 200 acres.<sup>21</sup>

This indenture made the 16th day of August in the year of Our Lord 1796 between George Smith and Elizabeth his wife of the County of Fayette and State of Kentucky of the one part and Samuel Scrogin of the County of Bourbon in the State aforesaid of the other part witnesseth that the said George Smith and Elizabeth his wife for and in consideration of the sum of 160 pounds to them in hand paid by the said Samuel Scrogin ... have ... sold ... unto ... Samuel Scrogin ... one certain tract ... of land ... containing 200 acres ... in the County of Bourbon and on the waters of Townsend Run and bounded as follows, to wit: beginning at an ash, buckeye and sugar tree corner with John Clarkson thence west 21 poles to 2 hickorys and white thorn then south 2 and 1/2 east 230 and 1/2 poles to buckeye, hickory and honey locust thence north 87 and 1/2 east 140 and 1/4 poles to a hickory and buckeye thence north 2 1/2 west 226 and 1/2 poles to a hickory, walnut, and sugar tree saplings thence south 8 7 and 1/2 west 119 and 1/4 poles white ash, sugar tree and buckeye thence north 2 and 1/2 west 4 poles to the beginning ... In witness whereof the said George Smith and Elizabeth his wife have hereunto set their hands and seals the day and year first above written.

Samuel (D5) and Betty Collins Scrogin sold half of this tract to their son Robert for five shillings on 01 August 1798:<sup>22</sup>

This indenture was made the 1st day of August, 1798 between Samuel Scrogin of Bourbon County and State of Kentucky the one party and Robert Scrogin of the same county and state of the other party. Witnesseth that the said Samuel Scrogin and Betty his wife for and in consideration of the sum of Five shillings current money to them in hand paid the receipt whereof they do hereby acknowledge hath



... sold ... unto the said Robert Scrogin ... a certain tract ... of land containing 100 acres ... in the County of Bourbon on the waters of Townsend Run and bounded as follows, to wit: Beginning at an ash, buckeye and sugar tree corner to John Clarkson, thence west 21 poles to two hickorys and a white thorn, thence south 2 1/2 degrees east 116 and 1/3 poles to stake, thence north 87 1/2 east 140 and 1/4 to a stake, thence north 2 and 1/2 degrees west 112 and 1/2 poles to a hickory, walnut and sugar tree sapling, thence north 87 and 1/2 degrees west 119 and 1/4 poles to a white ash, sugar tree and buckeye, thence north 2 1/2 west 4 poles to the beginning to have and to hold the said land and premises to the said Robert Scrogin ... and to the end that a complete and indefeasible title in fee simple and general warranty agreeable to the custom of the country may vest in the said Robert Scrogin ... Robert Scrogin (E10) went to Botetourt County, Virginia, to marry Narcissa Mills on 29 June 1797, apparently on the recommendation of his cousin William H. Edgar and Parson J. Tull. It appears that Robert was accompanied by his cousin Asher Boyce, who witnessed the consent of her father John Mills on 27 June 1797. Asher also witnessed the consent of Samuel Scrogin (D5) to Robert's marriage, which was dated 18 June 1797 in Bourbon County, Kentucky. The compilers misread the name Scrogin in a variety of ways:<sup>23</sup>

SENOGGIN, Robert (sig: Scrogire) & Narcissa Mills. 29 June, 1797.

Sur: Arch'd Mills (sig: A. E. Mills). Wit: H Bowyer.

CONSENT: 27 June, 1797. John Mills, father. (sp Scroggin). Wit: Arch'd E Mills; Asher Boyce.

CONSENT: Bourbon Co, Ky; June 18, 1797. Saml Scrogin, father of Rob't ----- to marry eldest daughter --- received information about dau from Parson J Tull & Wm H Edger. Wit: Asher Boyce.

Parson J. Tull may have been the Reverend Isaac Tull who resided in Bourbon County at this time. Perhaps the transcriber misread an I as a J.

Narcissa Mills Scrogin, who was born on 13 May 1777 in Botetourt County, Virginia, was a daughter of John Mills, Jr. and Martha Ewing, who were children of John and Anne Mills and Robert and Mary Baker Ewing. Mary "Polly" Mills who married George Scrogin (E11) was a sister of Narcissa Mills Scrogin.<sup>24</sup>

John Scrogin (E14) married Rachel Kendrick on 02 February 1808 in Bourbon County (Bourbon County, Kentucky, Marriage Book 2, page 30) and George Scrogin (E11) married Mary "Polly" Mills there on 20 March 1809.<sup>25</sup>

Samuel Scrogin (D5) and his sons Robert (E10), George (E11) and John (E14) were enumerated on the 1810 census for Bourbon County.<sup>26</sup>

John Scrogin (E14) apparently was identified as junior to differentiate him from his uncle John Scrogin (D2) of Bourbon County, whose son John, Jr. (E4) was 36 in 1810 and not a resident of Bourbon County.

Samuel Scrogin (D5) sold the remaining 100 acres of his land to son George Scrogin (E11) on 25 May 1818 for \$600.<sup>27</sup>

Narcissa Mills Scrogin, who was described as being weak in 1818, died on 19 May 1819.<sup>28</sup> Robert Scrogin (E10) married (2) Nancy Ward, daughter of Joseph Ward, in Bourbon County on 16 November 1819.<sup>29</sup>

Samuel (D5) and Betty Collins Scrogin apparently were residing with their son George Scrogin (E11) in 1820, since Samuel was not enumerated on the census as a head of household in Bourbon County. Robert Scrogin (E10) was living nearby:<sup>30</sup>

The second daughter aged under 10 probably was supposed to be entered as a son. John Gilchrist Scrogin (F36) was born on 12 January 1812.<sup>31</sup>

Louisa Scrogin (F34), daughter of Robert, married Daniel McClintock in Bourbon County on 07 July 1817.<sup>32</sup>

John Scrogin (E14) lived some distance away:<sup>33</sup>

Samuel Mills Scrogin (F62) and Eliza Scrogin (F37), children of Robert Scrogin (E10), testified in a court action in 1824. One of the principals of the lawsuit was Levin Polk Scrogin (E7), an executor, with James Kendrick, of the estate of Reuben George.<sup>34</sup>

Robert Scrogin (E10) was listed on the roster of the Kentucky Militia in 1802 as an ensign.<sup>35</sup> He was elected to the Kentucky House of Representatives from Bourbon County in 1805, 1808 and 1822. His son John Gilchrist Scrogin (F36), Esquire, of

Bourbon County, contributed material to Judge Lewis Collins of Mason County, Kentucky, when Collins was compiling a history of Kentucky in 1847.<sup>36</sup>

By 1825 John Scrogin (E14) was residing in Shelby County, Kentucky. In that year, the family apparently decided that, since John (E14) did not share in the previous division of his parents' land, an arrangement should be made which would give him equity with his brothers, Robert (E10) and George (E11), or at least with George, who previously paid his parents \$600 for half of their land.<sup>37</sup>

This Indenture was made on ... 5th day of September ... 1825 between Robert Scrogin of the County of Bourbon and the State of Kentucky of the one party and John Scrogin of the County of Shelby in the State aforesaid of the other party. Witnesseth that ... Robert Scrogin ... for \$624.00 ... has ... sold ... unto ... John Scrogin one ... tract ... of land ... in the County of Bourbon and on the waters of Silas Run ... Beginning ... corner to John E. Shropshire and Robert Griffith ... by my own land ... Jacob Coils line ... corner to L. Corbin ... with said Corbin and Joseph Shropshires line ... to John E. Shropshires line ... to the beginning containing 102 acres and 17 poles ... In witness whereof ...

Robert Scrogin (Seal)

The deed was acknowledged by Robert in Bourbon County Court on 05 September 1825 and produced for record on 30 November 1825.

The probability that this transaction was intended to produce sibling parity is demonstrated by the fact that in the following year, on 01 June 1826, John and Rachel Scrogin of Shelby County profitably sold the tract to John E. Shropshire for \$2042. Signed by John Scrogin and Rachel Scrogin, the deed was acknowledged by them in Bourbon County Court on 14 October 1826.<sup>38</sup>

Silas Creek forms the western end of the boundary between Bourbon County and Harrison County, before joining Townsend Creek, a tributary of the South Fork of the Licking River. The land of Samuel Scrogin (D5) probably lay between the two streams, in the western tip of Bourbon County, where it touches Scott and Harrison counties. There is a Shropshire Lane in this area off Newtown-Leesburg Road not far from Leesburg in Harrison County.

Robert Scrogin was one of the witnesses to the will of Jacob Coil that was dated 17 November 1827 and proved in July 1828.<sup>39</sup>

Samuel Scrogin (D5) died on 02 May 1830 according to his family register. Betty Collins Scrogin apparently died between the 1820 and 1830 censuses, also, since she was not residing with son George (E11) or son Robert (E10) in Bourbon County or with son John (E14) in Shelby County. George Scrogin supervised the Bourbon County census in 1830 and signed the enumeration on 10 November 1830 as Assistant to the Marshall for the District of Kentucky:<sup>40</sup>

The second male aged 20-30 with Robert Scrogin (E10) was not his son Samuel Mills Scrogin (F62), who was in Illinois in 1830 when his son George Washington Scrogin (G174) was born.<sup>41</sup>

Martha Scrogin (F38), daughter of George Scrogin (E11), married James Brown in 1827,<sup>42</sup> but perhaps they were living with her parents in 1830 to account for the female aged 20 to 30 and one of the males in the same age group.

Joseph Collins Scrogin (F39) reputedly died in infancy<sup>43</sup> but he seems to appear on the censuses of 1820 and 1830, so perhaps he lived to maturity and died young and unmarried.

John Scrogin (E14) was enumerated in Shelby County in 1830:<sup>44</sup>

It has not been determined whether Sally Scrogin (E12), the daughter of Samuel Scrogin (D5) and Betty Collins, lived to maturity and was married or not. It is possible that she was married and that Betty Collins Scrogin was living with her in 1830.

Robert Scrogin (E10) was born on 04 October 1776.<sup>45</sup> He married Narcissa Mills on 29 June 1797 and died on 01 April 1836, aged 59 years, 6 months and 4 days.<sup>46</sup> Robert Scrogin (E10) died in Bourbon County, Kentucky, where his will, dated 03 April 1833, was proved in Bourbon County Court at the April Term, 1836.<sup>47</sup> His heirs were wife Nancy Scrogin, daughters Louisa McClintock (F34), Amanda C. Eastin (F35), Mary B. Stewart (F63) and Eliza Scrogin (F37), sons Samuel M. (F62) and John G. Scrogin (F36), and granddaughter Margaret McClintock (G55). Wife Nancy was his second wife Nancy Ward, whom he married in Bourbon County, Kentucky, on 16 November 1819.<sup>48</sup>

The birth dates of the children of Robert Scrogin (E10) and Narcissa Mills<sup>49</sup> indicate that they were born while their parents resided in Bourbon County, Kentucky.

Amanda Collins Scrogin (F35) was born on 30 January 1808, moved to Henderson, Kentucky, and died on 07 July 1876.<sup>50</sup> Amanda C. Scrogin married Edward Eastin in Bourbon County on 26 June 1833.<sup>51</sup>

Louisa Scrogin McClintock (F34) was born on 22 August 1798, lived in Bourbon and Harrison counties, Kentucky, died on 26 October 1874 at the home of her son Robert McClintock (G57) and is buried at Collinsville, Ohio.<sup>52</sup>

Eliza Scrogin (F37), who was born on 05 June 1800 and died on 24 June 1876, apparently never married.<sup>53</sup>

Samuel Mills Scrogin (F62) was born in May 1802, lived in Tennessee, married Pheriba (Phereba, Ferriba) Gwynn (Gwinn, Guinn) and moved to Wise County, Texas, just before the Civil War. There he is reputed to have died shortly after his arrival. Pheriba Gwynn, who was born in 1803 in Tennessee and reportedly lived to the age of 104, was a daughter of John Gwynn and Jane Holbrook (Holbroke), who came to Tennessee from Wilkes County, North Carolina. John Gwynn was the son of Richard Gwynn and Sarah Ransome.<sup>54</sup>

Mary Baker Scrogin (F63) was born on 17 June 1804, married Thomas Laird Stewart on 22 or 29 August 1822 and died on 03 April 1897. Thomas Laird Stewart, who was born on 08 January 1797, was the son of Robert Stewart, who was born on 21 August 1768 in Pennsylvania and died in 1829 in Kentucky, and Margaret Beatty, who was born on 20 January 1774 in Pennsylvania and died in the 1850s in Indiana. They were married on 08 March 1796.<sup>55</sup>

John Gilchrist Scrogin (F36) was born on 12 January 1812, married Lovely Jones of Harrison County, Kentucky, moved to Grant County, Kentucky, and died in June 1874.<sup>56</sup> He was described as of Bourbon County in 1847.<sup>57</sup> This information is partially incorrect. John G. Scrogin (F36) was born on 30 January 1810, married Lovisa Nelson Jones on 24 March 1836 and died on 21 June 1874. Lovisa (Lovey, Lovely) Jones Scrogin was born on 27 September 1810 and died on 12 April 1882.<sup>58</sup> The family record copies were not dated but the handwriting suggests that they were done quite a long time ago. Only one page of the actual Bible record remains.

John G. Scrogin (F36) resided in the area of Downingsville Post Office, Grant County, Kentucky, on 28 June 1860.<sup>59</sup>

Robert G. Scroggin was Robert Jones Scrogin (G166) who was born on 15 January 1838 in Bourbon County and would have been 22 by the time the census was taken. John B. Scroggin was John Dumas Scrogin (G167) who was born on 28 December 1839 and would not be 21 until after the census. John G. Scrogin (F36) and Lovisa Jones had four other children who died young, William Mills Scrogin (G168) who was born on 23 February 1842 and died on 11 August 1849; George Thomas Scrogin (G169) who was born on 03 March 1845 and died on 08 August 1849; Alexander Blackburn Scrogin

(G170) who was born on 18 June 1847 and died on 27 February 1849; and Benjamin Franklin Scrogin (G171) who was born on 27 June 1849 and died on 12 February 1852.<sup>60</sup>

John Dumas Scrogin (G167) married Emma F. Conley (Conly) on 13 February 1862, had seven children and died on 08 November 1874. Emma Frances Conley was born on 22 August 1846. Their children were Lovisa Ann Scrogin (H180), who was born on 08 December 1862; Sally Bell Scrogin (H181), who was born on 13 May 1864; William Dumas Scrogin (H182) who was born on 25 December 1865; Laure Frances Scrogin (H183) who was born on 01 July 1868 and died in August 1869; Emma A. Scrogin (H184) who was born on 07 July 1870 and died, unwed, on 30 August 1900; Basil Duke Scrogin (H185) who was born in August 1871; and Julia Scrogin (H186), whose birth date was not entered.<sup>61</sup>

Emily Frances Conley was born in Grant County, Kentucky. William Dumas Scrogin married Laura Virginia Duvall and died on 25 April 1942 in Verona, Boone County, Kentucky. Sally Bell Scrogin, who was born in Owen County, Kentucky, married George Rex Kennedy on 25 February 1886 in Grant County, Kentucky, and died in June 1946 in Berwyn, Cook County, Illinois. Basil Duke Scrogin died in September 1895 in Shelby County, Kentucky, without marrying. Julia Scrogin, who was probably born about 1872, died on 26 September 1943 at Lakeland, Jefferson County, Kentucky, without marrying.<sup>62</sup>

The marriage of John Dumas Scrogin (G167) and Emma (Emily) F. Conley was recorded in Grant County, Kentucky, as occurring on 14 February 1862. The second marriage of Emma Conley Scrogin to A. T. Morin (Moran) also appears in the records of Grant County, along with the marriage of Sally Scrogin (H181) and George Rex Kennedy:<sup>63</sup>

The bond of John D. Scrogin and Emily F. Conley was dated 10 February 1862, with Thomas Ford as surety.<sup>64</sup>

J. S. Beverly was surety on the bond of Emma F. Scrogin and A. T. Morin:<sup>65</sup>

Emma F. Scrogin, resident of Grant County, aged 30; 2nd marriage; born Grant County; parents born Grant County; and A. T. Moran, resident of Grant County, aged 39; 1st marriage; teacher; born Campbell County; parents born Campbell County; to be married at bride's residence on 06 August 1876; bond issued 05 August 1876; J. S. Beverly, surety

The 1850 census index shows persons named Morin in Campbell County, but none with their names spelled Moran.

Sally Scroggin (H181) and George Rex Kennedy were married at the home of her mother, (Data of Sally Hamburg.) which indicates that her father died before her wedding.

Robert Jones Scroggin (G166) married Margaret Narcissa Early on 22 February 1866 and died on 20 February 1900.<sup>66</sup> Family records do not indicate their issue.

John Gilchrist Scroggin (F36) and John Dumas Scroggin (G167) apparently died intestate and their property was disposed of by court action.<sup>67</sup>

Whereas in the action of John D Scroggins Admrs, Plaintiff, against John D Scroggins Hrs & Crs, Defendant, pending in the Grant Circuit Court, an order was entered at the May Term, 1885, directing R H OHara, Master Commissioner of said Court, to expose for sale at public auction, to the highest and best bidder, the property hereinafter described; and Whereas said property was sold in accordance with said order, on the 14 day of September 1885, for the sum of One Thousand & thirty six Dollars and 12th Cents, when Robt Scroggin became the purchaser thereof; and Whereas the report of said sale was confirmed by said Court, at the Dec Term, 1885, and at the December Term, 1888, an order was entered directing James T Willis, Master Commissioner, to Execute a Deed of Conveyance of said property to said Robert J Scroggin but for greater certainty the record and proceedings in said case are referred to.

Now, therefore, this Indenture, made and entered into this 13th day of Dec 1885, between Emma F Morin Wm D Scroggin Basil W (sic) Scroggin Julia Scroggin L A Scroggin and Sally B Scroggin by James T Willis Master Commissioner of the said Court of the first part, and Robert J. Scroggin of the second part, Witnesseth that for and in consideration of the premises, and for the further consideration of the full payment of the purchase price aforesaid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, the parties of the first part, By James T Willis as Master Commissioner aforesaid, have sold, and by this writing do convey to said party of the second part, and his heirs and assigns forever, the following described property, to-wit: A Tract of land in Grant County Ky bounded and described as follows Beginning at (1) a stone .... Corner to R J Scroggin and the homestead thence with a line of the homestead ... to (26) a poplar on the East Bank of Buffalo Branch then ... to (21) a stone from which an oak bears ... then with T H Earleys line ... to (22) a stone in M J Jumps line thence with his line ... to (23) a stone Thence ... to (24) two Water Beeches and Cherry tree in Buffalo Branch and Corner to Jno S Beverly thence with his line ... to (25) a small elm thence ... to (11) an Elm thence ... to (14) a stone Corner to Robt J Scroggin thence with his line ... to (15) a stone thence ... to the Beginning Containing Eighty Six (86) acres one (1) Rood and fifteen (15) poles ... Whereas in the action of John G Scroggin's Admrs, Plaintiff, against John G Scroggins Hrs & Crs, Defendant, pending in the Grant Circuit Court, an order was entered at the May Term, 1884, directing R H OHara Master Commissioner



of the said Court ... and Whereas said property was sold ... on the 8 day of December 1884, for the sum of Two Hundred & Sixty Six Dollars and 48 Cents, when Robert J Scroggin became the purchaser thereof; and Whereas the report of said sale was confirmed by said Court, at the Dec Term 1884, and at the May Term, 1889, an order was entered directing James T Wills Master Commissioner, to Execute a Deed of Conveyance of said property to said Robt J Scroggin ... Now, therefore, this Indenture, made and entered into this 6th day of June 1889, between Emma T Scroggin now Morin Wm D Scroggin Basil W (sic) Scroggin Julia Scroggin L N (sic) Scroggin & Sally B Scroggin by James T Willis ... of the first part, and Robt J Scroggin of the second part, Witnesseth that ... the parties of the first part ... have sold ... to the party of the second part .. the following described property, to-wit:

Although Lovisa Ann Scroggin and Basil Duke Scroggin were involved in the deeds that were not finalized until 1899, they both apparently died in the interim. Lovisa Ann apparently died before 27 December 1894 when Basil wrote his will which was proved at the October 1895 term of Shelby County Court:<sup>68</sup>

Being it remembered that I, Basil D. Scroggin of Shelby County and the State of Kentucky, being of sound mind and memory but being aware of the uncertainty of life do make this my last will and testament.  
 After my just debts and funeral expenses are paid I bequeath as follows:  
 That my life insurance of one thousand dollars shall be paid to my sister Sallie Kennedy or her natural heirs.  
 That G. R. Kennedy and Sallie Kennedy shall have and hold possession of the remainder of my property for the term of five years.  
 That after the expiration of five years the remainder of my property consisting of live stock, money and land shall be divided among the following named persons as follows, Emma F. Scroggin, Sallie Kennedy, W. D. Scroggin, Julia Scroggin, G. R. Kennedy, Edward H. Morin, Emma C. Morin, and Roberta Morin.  
 That Edward Morin, Emma C. Morin and Roberta Morin shall each receive fifty dollars.  
 That the remainder shall be equally divided among all of the above named persons except the last three named.  
 That should G. R. Kennedy and Sallie Kennedy both die within the five years then my property shall be divided as herein set forth immediately.  
 I hereby appoint G. R. Kennedy as my executor without security of bond.  
 Written by my hand this December 27th, 1894.

Emma C. Morin must have been Emma Conley Scroggin Morin. Roberta Morin may have been a daughter of Emma C. Morin by her second husband, who probably was Edward H. Morin. Since Edward was old enough to prove Basil's will in court, he could not have been her child. Perhaps the initials A. T. on her marriage license were incorrect and should have been E. H.

It also is peculiar that Emma A. (F.) Scroggin was mentioned in Basil's will in 1894 but was not a participant in the earlier deeds with her siblings.

The vertical file Scroggins at the historical society in Owenton, Kentucky, includes some family records. The undated lists are written in ink in an old-fashioned script on four pages of ruled paper with a marginal line similar to legal notepaper, without source identification. A tattered and stained Bible record in the file, which did not photocopy good, was the source for some of this information.<sup>69</sup>

Conley, left an empty line between Laure Francis and Basil Duke, apparently for later insertion of the name of the child born between them; Emma A. Scrogin who was born in 1870. The blank following Julia apparently was left for later inclusion of her middle name, which has not been learned. Periods or dots that punctuated the entries, following each name and some other words,

have been eliminated for clarity. The birth year, 1841, of Margaret Narcissa Early was in a different handwriting and apparently in pencil. The birth month of Salley Bell was entered as Nov and crossed out, with May interlined in ink in a script differing from the other two.

Edward Franklin Eastin, who married Amanda Collins Scrogin, was the son of General Zachariah Eastin and Ann Durbin. Born on 17 January 1777, Zachariah was the second son of Augustine Eastin and Mary "Molly" Ford. Molly died during the birth of their sixth child. Augustine married (2) Judith Crouch by whom he had nine children (of which the second was the ancestor of Phyllis Clendaniel). Augustine Eastin was a son of Thomas Eastin and Sarah Whitlock, who owned land near Monticello, Thomas Jefferson's home in Albemarle County, Virginia. The second son of Augustin Eastin, Zachariah Eastin remained in Bourbon County. He was seven years old when he came from Virginia with his father. He served with some distinction during the War of 1812 and the Indian Wars. Mr. Edgar Eastin of Evansville, Indiana now has in his possession a commission signed by Governor Isaac Shelby and W. D. Mardin, Sec., September 10, 1813, appointing Zachariah Eastin as Major 2nd Battalion, 4th Regiment, Kentucky Volunteers. He served under General William Henry Harrison all through his campaigns in the West, taking part in the battles of Tippecanoe and The Thames. If the date of the commission is the actual date of his promotion as a Major, he must have been a Captain at the battle of Tippecanoe, which occurred November 7, 1811, and a Major at the battle of The Thames, which occurred late in 1813. Before the end of the war he was made a Colonel. He remained in the army after the war and rose to the rank of Brigadier-General, which rank he held until 1824, when he resigned and retired.

Virginia and Molly McBride were daughters of John McBride and Lucy J. Farmer.

George Rex Kennedy, who married Sally Bell Scrogin (H181) at the home of her mother in Grant County, Kentucky, on 25 February 1886, was a son of Emery Kennedy, who came from Greene County, Pennsylvania, and Mary Roberts of Warsaw in Gallatin County, Kentucky. George R. Kennedy was born on 27 December 1855 in Boone County, Kentucky, and died on 13 April 1938 at Erlanger in Kenton County, Kentucky. He is buried in the IOOF Cemetery at Owenton in Owen County, Kentucky. Sally Scrogin Kennedy (H181) is buried in the same cemetery.<sup>70</sup>

Basil Duke Scrogin (H185), who died in Shelby County, Kentucky, also is buried in the IOOF Cemetery at Owenton.<sup>71</sup>

When Emma A. Scrogin (H184) died on 30 August 1900, she was aged 30 years, 1 month and 23 days, which calculates to a birth date of 07 July 1870.

Julia Scrogin (H186) was a schoolteacher, aged about 18 and living with her parents, when she suffered a severe fever that caused permanent brain damage. When her mother died about 1920 at Jonesville, Kentucky, Julia went to live with the family of William D. Scrogin (H182). Jonesville is in Grant County near Downingsville and the Owen County line. Julia later died at Central State Hospital, Lakeland, Kentucky.<sup>72</sup>

When Robert Jones Scrogin (G166) died on 20 February 1900, he was aged 63 years, 1 month and 3 days, which calculates to a birth date of 17 January 1837.<sup>77</sup> After his death, his widow Margaret N. Scrogin applied for a Confederate widow's pension in Grant County, Kentucky, according to an index of applications made in 1912 and 1915. She stated that Robert J. Scrogin was born in Harrison County, Kentucky, married Margaret N. Early in 1866 in Owen County, Kentucky, served in the War Between the States in the CSA and died in 1900 in Grant County, Kentucky.<sup>78</sup>

Samuel Mills Scrogin (F62) and his two oldest sons were enumerated as heads of families on the census of District 11 of Fentress County, Tennessee, on 28 August 1850:<sup>79</sup>

Family records state that George Washington Scroggins (G174) was born in Springfield, Illinois, in 1830,<sup>80</sup> so the birthplace of South Carolina shown on the census abstract probably is an incorrect transcription. From the ages and birthplaces of the children of Samuel Mills Scrogins (F62) and Pheriba Gwynn shown on the 1850 census, it appears that Samuel and Pheriba moved from Tennessee to Illinois about 1829, to Missouri before 1832 and then back to Tennessee between 1835 and 1839, but census data are sometimes unreliable and may be affected by the facts that Samuel Mills Scrogins (F62) received a Tennessee land grant dated 06 May 1830 for 200 acres on Cobb Branch and Sequatchie Road in Fentress County and another one (No. 4267-8) for 300 acres on 08 January 1835.<sup>81</sup> This suggested chronology indicates that Samuel (F62) was not one of the males age 20-30 in the residence of his father Robert Scrogin (E10) in Bourbon County, Kentucky, in 1830.

Elizabeth "Liza" Jane Scroggins (G175), who was born about 1830-32, married James A. Frogge on 19 July 1850 in Fentress County, Tennessee, before the census was taken. She died on 28 January 1908 or 20 January 1909 at Metcalfe in Edmondson County,

Kentucky. James M. Frogge, who was the son of William and Mary Frogge, was born on 09 April 1832 in Fentress County and died on 21 January 1908 or 1911 at Metcalfe.<sup>82</sup> Samuel Mills Scrogin (F62), who was a surveyor, kept a journal that was in the possession of his grandson Samuel Leonard Scroggins (H217) of Jamestown, Tennessee, in 1970.<sup>83</sup>

Based on subsequent dates, the first date, transcribed as 1856, probably should have been 1836. Also, the copyist transcribed Obed River as Ohio River in error. The East Fork of the Obed River drains the adjoining Overton and Fentress counties in north central Tennessee. The writing in the book was described as being so faded that it was difficult to read.

After the death of Samuel Leonard Scroggins (H217) in 1981, the journal passed to his son Howard Scroggins (J179) of Grandview, Tennessee, who keeps it in a bank vault in Crossville, Tennessee. Samuel Leonard Scroggins (H217) was a son of George Washington Scroggins (G174) and Hannah Clayborn and a grandson of Samuel Mills Scrogin (F62).

In his journal, Samuel Mills Scrogin (E62) spelled his name Scrogin, although his descendants used Scrogins and Scroggins.

Samuel Mills Scrogin (F62) rode a white mule to Wise County, Texas, which is northwest of and adjacent to Tarrant County in which Fort Worth is located. He reputedly carried a man's sock full of gold. While helping dig a well in Wise County, Samuel needed to go some distance to get something. His white mule was nearby, but without his bridle, so he attempted to use a log chain in place of the bridle. The mule threw him and Samuel was killed, probably about 1865. It is likely that Samuel went to Texas with his son Balam (Balum) after the Civil War, probably through the influence of Balam's brother-in-law, Pleasant Lewis. Miranda Elvira Lewis who married Balam Scroggins was a daughter of Robert and Sarah Lewis of Marion County, Illinois. Balam Scroggins, Andy Scroggins and George Gwinn are on a list of early settlers in Wise County, living in the Hog Branch area, south of the town of Boyd.<sup>84</sup> A biographical sketch of Pleasant Lewis is accompanied by a photograph captioned, "Pleasant Lewis hits Wise County on a jennette, 17 August 1865." The first settler in Wise County was Sam Moody who arrived there in 1864.

Balam Scroggins served the Confederacy during the Civil War, enlisting in Tennessee. He was captured and paroled at Vicksburg. He was in Wise County by 1870 when he was listed on the census as aged 36 and born in Tennessee.<sup>85</sup> Balam Hamilton Scroggins was born on 04 March 1844 in Tennessee, married Miranda Elvira Lewis and died in 1920 in Wise County, Texas, where he is buried in Hog Branch Cemetery, south of Boyd.<sup>86</sup>

Robert Frank (Franklin) Scrogin (G173), who was an Union soldier in the Civil War, also went to Wise County, where he filed for a pension in 1888. Born on 08 November 1828 at Jamestown, Fentress County, Tennessee, he married (1) Elizabeth Pultz (Pulse), daughter of John Pultz and Anna Mullinix, who died on 18 September 1864 at Vienna in

Johnson County, Illinois, and (2) Henrietta L. Walker, daughter of John S. and Sarah A. Walker on 23 December 1869 in Carrollton, Carroll County, Arkansas. Robert Frank died on 20 January 1900 at Boyd, Wise County, Texas, and is buried in the Arkansas Cemetery at Boyd. His widow Henrietta applied for a pension that year from Wise County. Henrietta, who was born in 1845 at Eureka Springs, Carroll County, Arkansas, married (2) William Brown Lyons. One of Robert Frank Scrogin's sons by his first wife, Commodore Perry Scroggins (H208), migrated to Wise County with his grandfather and died from a rattlesnake bite on the way or shortly after arriving.<sup>87</sup>

George Washington Scroggins (G174) was born on 30 December 1830 in Springfield, Illinois, married (1) Elizabeth Zachery and (2) Hannah Clayborn (Clayburn) in 1895 and died on 13 January 1918 in Fentress County, Tennessee, and is buried in the cemetery on the homestead. Hannah Clayborn, who was born on 11 October 1874 and died on 23 January 1937, was a daughter of Leonard E. Clayborn and Matilda Rich. Roxie Freela Scroggins (H228), daughter of George W. Scroggins (G174) and Hannah Clayborn, married Ivan Jacob Choate (K124), grandson of George Washington Choate and Nina Scroggins (H200). Nina was a daughter of John G. Scroggins (G172) and Margaret Pultz (Pulse). This means that Geraldine Choate Duncan (L127), daughter of Ivan Choate and Roxie Scroggins, is a double Scroggins.<sup>88</sup>

John G. Scroggins (G172), who was born in Tennessee in 1826, remained in there and served as a private in the Union Scouts commanded by "Tinker" Dave Beaty for which he received a pension. He died on 03 February 1872 and is buried in the John Scroggins Cemetery in Fentress County, Tennessee. He married Margaret Pultz (Pulse), daughter of John Pultz and Anna Mullinix, on 24 October 1846. She was born in 1827 and died in Fentress County, where she is buried in the Pulse Cemetery. Among others, John and Margaret were the parents of Amanda Jane Scroggins (H199), who was born 03 November 1850 in Fentress County, where she died on 24 May 1933 and is buried in Fairview Cemetery. Amanda married John Chapman on 25 June 1893. Their daughter Sarah Chapman (J151) married Peter Green and had Edna Pearl Green (K115) who married George W. Patton. George Patton and Pearl Green were the parents of Caster Denton Patton (L112).<sup>89</sup>

George Scrogin (E11) was born on 19 June 1779, married Mary B. "Polly" Mills on 20 March 1809 and died on 23 July 1852. Polly Mills Scrogin was born on 03 July 1779 and died in September 1865.<sup>97</sup>

Martha Scrogin (F38) was born on 01 February 1810 and married James Brown on 13 December 1827,<sup>98</sup> but other family records state that they were married on 04 June 1827 in Bourbon County, Kentucky.<sup>99</sup>

Joseph Collins Scrogin (F39) was born on 30 September 1811 and died in infancy,<sup>100</sup> however he appears to have been living with his parents on the 1820 and 1830 censuses, so perhaps he died as a young man and unmarried.

Sallie Amelia Scrogin (F40) was born on 05 May 1814, married Samuel Durley in 1834<sup>101</sup> and died on 23 March 1849 in Pettis County, Missouri.<sup>102</sup>

Mildred Scrogin (F41) was born on 22 August 1816, married Milton Thomson (Thompson) and died in September 1851.<sup>103</sup> Mildred Ann Scrogin (F41) and Milton T. Thomson were married on 26 September 1837 in Georgetown, Pettis County, Missouri. Milton, who was born on 25 March 1813 in Scott County, Kentucky, and died on 12 August 1885 in Pettis County, Missouri, was the son of David Thomson and Betsey Suggett, who were married in Scott County on 05 September 1801. David Thomson, who was born on 21 August 1775 in Louisa County, Virginia, and died on 26 October 1861 in Pettis County, was the son of William Thomson and Anne Rodes. Betsey Suggett, who was born on 14 June 1782 at Bryan Station in Kentucky and died on 11 April 1852 in Pettis County, was a daughter of John Suggett and Mildred Davis. Mildred Ann Scrogin (F41), who signed her name Mildred A. Thomson and called by the nickname "Millie," also was known as Amelia Ann Thomson. Milton T. Thomson, who completed English studies at Georgetown College in Georgetown, Scott County, Kentucky, on 20 March 1833, attended West Point but dropped out to accompany his family west to Missouri, shortly after his marriage. He entered land there, with his father, brothers, and two Scroggins relatives, in Township 46, Ranges 21 and 22. In 1838 Millie's father wrote to her from Franklin County, Kentucky, that he was ill and was sending her bed and some housekeeping articles to her, as well as some sheep from his stock. However, he recovered from his illness and subsequently moved to Missouri where he and his wife died. Milton Thomson participated in the Gold Rush to California, leaving home when Millie was pregnant. During his absence, she and two of her daughters, died. Son Milton died after his father returned home. Before Millie died, she wrote to her husband, letters that still exist in the Western Historical Manuscript Collection at the University of Missouri with other family correspondence. One of Millie's letters to Milton told of surviving a life-threatening illness. When Milton returned from California, he brought a shawl to his wife, apparently unaware of her death. The shawl and a cane belonging to Milton are in the possession of descendant Carolyn Berry. The 1840 and 1850 Federal Censuses for Pettis County, Missouri, list Milton Thomson as follows:<sup>104</sup>

George Collins Scrogin (F42) was born on 11 April 1818 and married Mary Rowland (Rolland) on 05 October 1843. He went to California in 1852.<sup>105</sup>

Charles Mills Scrogin (F43) was born on 17 March 1820, married Mary Rice on 16 January 1850 and died in 1884.<sup>106</sup>

Thomas Davis Scrogin (F44) was born in Kentucky on 05 July 1823, married America Curry in 1851, moved to Pike County, Missouri, in 1856 and died on 13 November 1862.<sup>107</sup> Thomas Davis Scrogin (F44) and America Curry had a son Frank E. Scrogin (Scroggins) who was born on 12 May 1853. Frank (G81) had a daughter Lillie Lee Scroggins (H117) who married ----- Lust and had a daughter Sybel Lust (J91).<sup>108</sup> In the winter of 1849 one Thomas D. Scroggins left Independence, Missouri, in a mule-drawn light wagon to transport mail to Salt Lake City. James Brown (F6) and Samuel H. Woodson employed him in a monthly mail service between those two points.<sup>109</sup>

All of the children of George Scrogin (E11) apparently were born while their parents resided in Bourbon County.

Mary B. Mills, who was born in Virginia and died in Missouri, was the daughter of John Mills, who was born in Ireland in 1750 and died in 1833 in Botetourt County, Virginia, or Ohio County, West Virginia, and of Martha Ewing, who was born after 1750 in Bedford County, Virginia, and died before 1785. John Mills entered the army as an ensign and served in the Revolutionary War. He received commutation pay for service as a

lieutenant in Gibson's detachment of the Virginia Continental Line. In 1838 his widow applied for a pension, which was allowed. Martha Ewing was the daughter of Robert Ewing, a native of Londonderry, Ireland who died in Bedford County, Virginia, in June 1787, and of Mary Baker, who was born in 1730 and died in Bedford County, Virginia.<sup>110</sup>

George Scrogin (E11), who was born in Sussex County, Delaware, and died in Pettis County, Missouri, is buried there in the Scroggin Cemetery in Cedar Township.<sup>111</sup>

James Brown (F6), who married Martha Scrogin (F38), was the son of Jesse Brown and Elizabeth Scrogin (E1), daughter of John Scrogin (D2) and Eunice Polk.

Charles Mills Scrogin (F43) and his wife Mary Rice, who were married in Cooper County, Missouri, {Ancestry's Missouri Marriage Index, John M. Scroggins <[scroggjm@erols.com](mailto:scroggjm@erols.com)> 19 Jul 2001}, apparently were the parents of Charles H. Milton Temilicus Thomson was a son of General David Thomson (born 21 Aug 1775 in Louisa County, Virginia; died 26 Oct 1861 in Pettis County, Missouri) and Betsey Suggett (born 14 Jun 1782 at Bryan Station in Kentucky; died 11 Apr 1852 in Pettis County), who were married in Scott County, Kentucky on 05 September 1801. Mrs. Daisy L. Thomson Barron (NSDAR National No. 82353), wife of Walter Clyde Barron, joined the DAR against the service of Betsey's father John Suggett (born 1751 Virginia; died 1834 in Kentucky), who was among those who first made public resistance to the Stamp Act and, with his wife Mildred Davis (1756-1834), assisted in the defense of Bryan Station in Kentucky in 1782.

Charles Willis Carter Walker was the son of James T. Walker, who was born in the Carolinas on 04 October 1793, and Mourning Carter, who was born in Wythe County, Virginia, on 03 August 1800. They were married in Pulaski County, Kentucky, on 23 October 1817. Mourning Carter was the daughter of Charles Carter and Elizabeth Kendrick.

James Thomson Walker (H383) was shot by Will Dyer. William Walker (H384) is buried with his grandparents at Mt. Herman. Mildred Louise Walker (H385) was an artist. Joseph Willis Walker (H388) was shown as a widower on his death certificate.<sup>112</sup>

Charles W. C. Walker and his family are enumerated twice on the 1870 census for Pettis County, Missouri. On 28 July 1870 they were tabulated with his father-in-law, whom they may have been visiting. Edwin Harris Berry was the son of Thomas Copher Berry, who was born on 19 December 1827 in Rockeport, Boone County, Missouri, and died on 18 March 1920 in Sweet Springs, Saline County, Missouri, and Mary Jane Prigmore, who was born on 11 January 1835 in Pettis County and died there on 04 January 1894. They were married on 08 November 1851 in Crown Hill, Pettis County. Mary Walker was the daughter of Charles Willis Carter Walker and Martha Vienna Thomson (G265).

Edwin Harris Berry was born in the Prigmore house, where his mother, eight sisters and one brother were also born. The Berry-Prigmore family cemetery is in a field near the house that is presently owned by Minnie Parsons. Edwin, who was called "Daddy" by Carolyn Berry (K306), died on a Sunday evening. Carolyn recalls that her grandmother Mary cooked great family dinners with things like family cured ham, turkey, gravy, biscuits, rolls, cornbread and tomato aspic.

Edwin Harris Berry and Mary Walker Berry are buried in Fairview Cemetery in Sweet Springs, Missouri. Edwin Walker Berry died in the Sweet Springs Hospital.<sup>113</sup>

Thomas Copher Berry was the son of the Reverend Tyre Harris Berry, who was born on 25 October 1800 in Madison County, Kentucky, and died on 13 September 1871 in Mt. Zion Church, Johnson County, Missouri, and Hettie Boone Copher, who was born on 22 December 1803 in Clark County, Kentucky, and died on 25 February 1842 in Brownsville, Saline County, Missouri. Tyre and Hettie were married on 28 June 1821 in Boone County, Missouri. Hettie Boone Copher (Cofer) was a daughter of Jesse Cofer (1756-1822) and Elizabeth Boone (1765-1855).<sup>114</sup> Elizabeth Boone was a daughter of George Boone and Ann "Nancy" Linville and a granddaughter of Squire Boone and Sarah Morgan.<sup>115</sup>

Elizabeth Kendrick was a daughter of John Kendrick (Kindrick), Sr. and Elizabeth Preston. After selling land in Henry County, Virginia on 28 October 1779, John and Elizabeth moved to Washington County, Virginia, where he died in 1801. John Kendrick, Jr., who was born in 1750 in Henry County, married Virginia E. Summers in Washington County in 1804 and died there in 1812. His children moved to Kentucky where they married and lived at Monticello in Wayne County and Somerset in Pulaski County.<sup>116</sup>

James Brown (F6), who married Martha Scrogin (F38), was the son of Jesse Brown and Elizabeth Scrogin (E1), daughter of John Scrogin (D2) and Eunice Polk.

James Brown, and his sons Samuel and James are buried in the Scroggins Cemetery in Pettis County, Missouri. [121](#)

James Brown bought a lot in Georgetown in Pettis County for \$35.00 on 09 December 1837. In 1838 he began buying land two miles east of Georgetown and owned 1218 acres of good farmland when he died. All but 108 acres of which were in a contiguous parcel. He was elected to the Pettis County Court in 1838 and served four years. Afterward he was known as Judge Brown.

It is not known when Judge Brown entered the freighting business but he was carrying mail from Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, to Santa Fe, New Mexico, as early as 1847. His records for that year report that suffered hardship by blizzard as well as attacks by hostile Pawnees, Comanches and renegade Mexicans. In 1846 when the War Department established permanent posts in New Mexico, the Army began operating trains of freighters, driven by civilians who were called "bullwhackers," to deliver supplies to the forts from Fort Leavenworth, over the Santa Fe Trail. Due to mismanagement by inexperienced officers and inefficient drivers, the Army decided to assign the freighting operations to civilian contractors a year later. James Brown was one of first to enter this business, obtaining a contract on 17 May 1848 to deliver 200,000 pounds of supplies to Santa Fe without delay for 11 and 3/4 cents a pound. The following day, he was awarded a second contract to transport any and all government supplies delivered to him by the quartermaster. He posted a \$50,000 bond to cover the first agreement and \$60,000 for the second. These bonds were co-signed by a number of Pettis County residents. Upon completing the first contract, Brown was paid \$23,000.

After this successful enterprise, the Army adopted the civilian contractor system to deliver its supplies. In 1849 Brown entered into partnership with William. H. Russell of Lexington, Missouri, to freight military supplies across the Great Plains. The wagons of Brown & Russell were busy constantly that year. In September Brown and two other men were robbed and captured by forty Arapahos and Apaches in New Mexico. After threatening to kill them, the Indians gave them three mules and released them to return to Independence, Missouri. Three days later, they met a group, on their way to California, who gave them food and blankets.

On 01 October 1849 Brown left with a train of twenty wagons for Santa Fe which encountered a three-day blizzard that began on 17 November. He survived but lost all his oxen. That same year, John S. Jones of Pettis County joined Brown & Russell. They won a contract on 05 March 1850 to handle freight to Fort Hall, Idaho. On 01 August 1850 Brown and Samuel H. Woodson of Independence acquired a contract from the U. S. Post Office to carry mail between Independence and Salt Lake City for \$19,500 per year but this venture was unsuccessful.

In the summer of 1850, Brown, Russell & Company were granted a contract to deliver 600,000 pounds to Santa Fe at 14 and 1/3 cents per pound. The shipment required 135 wagons and 1,600 oxen, which were to travel in five segments. Brown led the first group, which left Leavenworth on 14 September 1850. On 25 November the train became snowbound by a blizzard 45 or 50 miles from its destination. Brown rode ahead to report the delay and became ill with typhoid fever and erysipelas. He died on 05 December 1850. It was reported on 03 February 1851 that a party of nine men returned his remains home. His body was interred near his residence just south of the Georgetown-Arrow Rock Road.

After receiving Brown's report of the delay, the commanding officer in Santa Fe ordered Brown's assistant Charles O. Jones, younger brother of John S. Jones, to bring the supplies in regardless of cost or circumstances. In doing so, Jones incurred bills totaling \$14,000 for feed and oxen replacement. Later William H. Russell petitioned Congress for reimbursement of a loss of \$39,800 on the venture. On 29 July 1854, Congress awarded the firm \$38,800 on the basis that the commander had exceeded his authority in ordering Jones to deliver the freight despite the cost.

At his unexpected death, Judge Brown left his wife, Martha Scrogin Brown, six children, some slaves and debts in the amount of \$59,882.47. To satisfy the creditors, his executor, brother John S. Brown (F6), had to liquidate all of his assets excepting the widow's 1/3rd dower interest in the farm. The estate was settled finally on 04 August 1857 with Brown's share of the Congressional award.

Brown's pioneer entry into the speculative and dangerous freighting business was one of the first organized transportation systems in the West. It blazed the way for future freighters, who kept the area supplied, in the years before railroads were built across the plains. By keeping the Army supplied, Brown enabled it to take control of the Great Plains, West and Southwest from the Mexicans and Indians that, in turn, made it possible for permanent settlements to arise.<sup>122</sup>
